Housing Stabilization Services Short-Term Housing Assistance Program and Community Provider Information

Purpose: This document provides a general overview of the Housing Stabilization Services Short-Term Housing Assistance program, eligibility information and a list of community providers.

Short-Term Housing Assistance Program: Contracted service providers may offer short-term rental assistance on a month-by-month basis for households that meet financial need requirements. This short-term assistance can help with housing-related costs, including rent, security deposits, utility payments and other approved fees.

Eligibility: To receive Housing Stabilization Services, individuals and households must meet the following eligibility requirements:

- Arrived in Washington state on or after July 1, 2021.
- Have an immigration status that makes them eligible for federal resettlement services, including:
 - o Refugee.
 - o People granted asylum on or after July 1, 2021.
 - o Citizens and nationals of Afghanistan paroled into the U.S. between July 31, 2021 and Sept. 30, 2022.
 - o Citizens and nationals of Ukraine paroled into the U.S. between Feb. 24, 2022 and Sept. 30, 2023.
 - Cuban and Haitian Entrants.
 - o Certain Amerasians from Vietnam.
 - Special Immigrant Visa holders from Iraq or Afghanistan.

Program Enrollment Considerations:

- Recipients who received the Tier 1 Housing Stabilization one-time cash benefit in June 2022 are unable to receive ongoing rental assistance for at least three months after receipt of the benefit. For example, if you received a check directly from one of the partners below in June 2022, you will not be eligible for additional, ongoing rental assistance until September 2022 at the soonest.
- Rental assistance payments must be made directly to landlords and third-party vendors.
- Eligible households must demonstrate a financial need for housing or utility assistance by disclosing all
 household members' income and resources, and showing inadequate income and resources to cover monthly
 rent and basic utilities.
